enry Rupert Bain, a wealthy young financier and an avid outdoorsman must have thought he had discovered his own "little piece of heaven" when he came upon a sprawling 100 acre tract of land with a spectacular view of the pastures and

woodlands surrounding the Don River.

After purchasing the land in 1934, he commissioned architects George and Moorehouse to design a 29-room Georgian mansion, indicative of the English manorial style so popular with his fellow Canadam financiers. This magnificent structure was completed in 1936 at an estimated cost of \$250,000 and although humbly referred to as Graydon House, the estate was only surrossed in grandeup to Casa Lown.

the estate was only surpassed in grandeur by Clasa Loma. During their brief but eventful tenure in the manor, hundreds of guests of Rupers and Aleen Bain passed through the impressive stone gates to enjoy a day of polo, fox hunting or golf. Invitations to their elegant balls, formal dinners, and huge breakfasts on the terrace were highly covered by friends and neighbours. Scepping out onto the grand forecourt surrounded by natural coursed fieldstone walls, visitors entered Graydon Hall through the ashlar porte cochere, resplendent with channelled limestone pilasters and topped by a pannelled stone paraoet.

parapet.

The manor, also built of natural coursed fieldstone and trimmed with Indiana limestone, required a staff of 10 and boasted 10 bedrooms, 9 bathrooms and 10 fireplaces.

Exquisite architectural details; mahogary and pine paneling, instricate custom moldings and Travertine marble floors graced the west wing's principal rooms. Interior decorator R. Malcolm Slimon furnished the rooms in a formal and traditional style with adornments typical of a luxurious lifestyle; hand painted Chinoiserie wallpaper, persian rugs, ribbed silk drapery, Chippendale furnishings and Chinese porcelains.

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To accentuate the breathtaking view from Graydon Hall's massive south terrace, Rupert Bain employed the talented landscape architectural firm of Dunnington-Grubb and Stensson (founder of Sheridan Nurseries) to design the five

acres of formal gardens. A tea pavillion and lawn promenade led to the fountain court, down to an informal pool, then on to cascades that fell between rock gardens to another large limestone pool. A nine-hole golf course completed the landscape that was kept clipped to perfection by a troupe of gardeners.

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His love of travel took Rupert Bain on many holidays to exotic locations. While on vacation in Mexico in 1952 he died at the age of 54 of a head injury sustained during an earlier riding accident.

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Graydon Hall was then sold to Nelson H. Davis and his family, Mr. Davis, a successful Toronto business man, President of Intercity Forwarders Limited and the H.M. Davis Corporation Limited, subsequently sold the manor to Normoc Limited and Combo Construction Limited in 1964. The house now lends its name to a subdivision road which has brought new houses and high-rise apartments to the area. However, the private enclosed nature of the design still works to retain a quiet air of dignity about the house.

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The present owners of Graydon Hall purchased the 1.5 acre estate in 1977. It has been used primarily since that time as office space and a sought after location for film and commercial theory.

Following a major restoration in recent months, a talented team of Toronto's finest interior designers and landscape architects have restored Graydon Hall to its original state of elegant sophistication.
